





4.9 Important Language Notes: Telling Time, Mistakes and Job Titles

- 1. We do not say "nineteen p.m." That is a Japanese way of telling time. We always say "seven p.m." or "seven o'clock in the evening" or most commonly "seven in the evening" or just "seven" if the evening part is understood. (The military do say nineteen hundred hours.)
- 2. "miss" does not mean "mistake". We say "I made a mistake." or "I missed the train."
- 3. We never say "He is a salaryman". This is Japanese-English, a word Japanese people use that sounds English, but is not used the same way in English. We sometimes say "He is an office worker." If we do not say a job title, we usually say the type of company. "I work for a phone company."
