How students can practice with this book:

You can do this before or after lessons. Ask your teacher what they recommend for you.

- 1. Read a unit.
- 2. Read the Listening Text aloud.
- 3. Read the Speaking Practice drills aloud.
- 4. Write out the Speaking Practice drills in a notebook.
- 5. Translate the Speaking Practice drills to Japanese.
- 6. Cover the English. Look only at your Japanese translation. Translate it back to English.
- 7. Copy out the Listening Text into a notebook.
- 8. Translate the Listening Text into Japanese.
- 9. Cover the English. Look only at your Japanese translation. Translate it back to English.

More ways to practice your English:

- 1. Write a diary. Try to use the Practice Sentences of new words from today's unit if possible.
- 2. Write in your diary. Explain something your saw on TV, on the internet, while you were out today.
- 3. Write a letter or email for a purpose. For example, email a hotel in America to ask if they have rice cookers in their kitchenettes. Or email a mobile phone shop in England to ask how much it costs to rent a mobile wi-fi router for 5 days if you go on holiday there. Businesses are politer than most places on the internet because they want to sell you things. Remember to make a free email address on Gmail. Don't use your real name or email address. You might get lots of sales junk emails.
- 4. Join a community on the internet. For example, a group that likes Japanese food on Facebook; or a group that is interested in Japanese culture on Reddit; or answer a question about Japan on Quora. It is a chance to communicate in real English with real people. But remember, be careful with your personal information on the internet.
- 5. Try searching for information in English next time you Google something. Did you know 55% of the internet is in English, but only 4% is in Japanese. You open up more of the world to you if you try things in English. (Source: https://www.statista.com/chart/26884/languages-on-the-internet/)
- 6. Rent DVDs with English and Japanese subtitles. Watch the movies with English audio and Japanese subtitles. If you like one of the characters, go back and watch a 5-minute part with that character, but change to English audio AND English subtitles! Try to copy how they speak.
